2017 was another great year of continued growth at The Link. We successfully opened the Suburban Rapid Rehousing program, our new housing program for youth experiencing homelessness in the suburbs. This new program provides 30 units of housing to help youth struggling with homelessness in Anoka, Dakota, Scott, Carver, and Washington counties. As we know, youth experiencing homelessness live both within our urban and suburban communities and we at The Link are fortunate to be able to have programming for youth regardless of where they live in the Twin Cities and the suburbs.

At The Link, as well as across the country, we see the impacts that racism, homophobia, and transphobia have in terms of the disproportionate rates of LGBTQ and youth of color who are experiencing homelessness. We are proud to provide culturally specific programming at The Link for African American families as well as LGBTQ youth. We continue to work hard every day to directly help youth and families impacted by poverty, many forms of oppression and social injustice while we work towards larger systemic change within our local and national communities to end sex trafficking, homelessness and to reform our juvenile justice systems.




Thank you so much for your support over the last year. We truly appreciate all that you do to help us continue to overcome the impacts of poverty and social injustice.

youth experiencing homelessness were housed in under 7 months in our new Suburban Rapid Rehousing program




LGBTQ youth experiencing homelessness gained stable housing through our culturally specific Project Live Out Loud program

HOURS OF CASE MANAGEMENT PROVIDED



Every youth and family throughout The Link's 19 programs have access to a case manager. Case managers support each youth they work with by helping them achieve their goals around stable housing, education, mental health, physical health, employment and connecting to resources in their community.

SUBURBAN RAPID REHOUSING

The Link opened the Suburban Rapid Rehousing Program in March of 2017 to respond to the specific needs of youth experiencing homelessness in our suburban communities. The program houses 30 youth ages 18 through 24 who are identified as long-term homeless and are living either in emergency shelter or in a place not fit for human habitation. Youth are able to transition quickly from the streets and emergency shelter into stable housing and can stay in the program for up to two years. Youth are housed in market-rate apartments in the community. Youth sign a lease, which allows them to build rental history, and The Link provides the landlord with rental subsidies. Once youth have a safe and secure home, they are able to work closely with case managers on more long-term goals which include gaining the practical skills required to live independently.

Programming helps youth to address the trauma of homelessness while also addressing concerns related to mental health, chemical dependency, and other barriers that contributed to their homelessness. The program provides intensive case management that assures youth are connected to community resources, enrolled in health insurance, and are engaged in activities that will further their education and increase their income. Working holistically with youth experiencing homelessness allows the youth to develop the protective factors that will help them maintain housing permanency in the future and heal from the trauma they have experienced on the streets.



32 YOUTH SECURED HOUSING IN 2017

"Monica learned from an early age how to be independent and take care of herself; at times that meant staying with an abusive boyfriend to have a place to sleep, even sleeping outside or in a shelter in St. Paul as long as she could get to work. Through her weekly meetings with her housing case manager, Monica has established stability with housing and increased skills with managing her finances. Her case manager has been the source of consistent support for Monica through these tremendous transitions towards independence and stability. She was a timid and apprehensive young person when she first began working with The Link, and now has self-assured confidence that she has what it takes to be successful as she enters into adulthood."


